RECREATIONAL RESOURCES

BOATING & FISHING:

The First Homeowners Association owns 30 acre Lake Anne and is responsible for its maintenance. Access to Lake Anne, for residents who do not have Lake privileges, is through the First Homeowners Association Boat and Canoe Rental, located on Washington Plaza during the summer months.

Residents with riparian rights may use their own canoes, sailboats, or electric motor boats. No craft may exceed the length of 18 feet.

Lake Anne is regularly stocked with bass and blue gill.

CAMPING:

Sites for day and overnight camping have been set aside. Information may be obtained from Vernon Walker, Director of the Nature Center.

GARDENING:

Garden plots and toolshed lockers are available at a nominal rent (applications at Lake Anne Hall). These plots, located on the Transcontinental Gas Line right-of-way at the lower end of Lake Anne, are accessible from the end of Fairway Drive (at Wiehle Avenue). General advice on their use can be obtained from Vernon Walker, Director of Reston's Nature Center.

GOLF:

In 1970, the 18-hole Reston North Golf Course will become a private golf and country club, complete with clubhouse, pro shop, sauna, yearround swimming pool, indoor handball courts, exercise rooms for both men and women, and tennis courts.

Simultaneously, the 18-hole Reston South

Golf Course will be opened to the public complete with clubhouse and pro shop.

The Reston Golf & Country Club is located in Lake Anne Village just off North Shore Drive opposite the elementary school. The South Golf Course is located south of the Dulles Access Road adjacent to the 21 acre site of Reston's Inn and Conference Center. Both courses, designed by golf course architect, Edmund B. Ault, are championship courses and follow the natural contours of the rolling hillside.

PLAYGROUNDS:

Reston includes play areas and specially designed play sculpture convenient to homes and apartments. In addition, ball diamonds, football fields, basketball courts, a volleyball/badminton court, and other open play areas are located throughout Reston. RIDING:

The Reston South Riding Center is located on Reston Avenue in Hunters Woods Village. The 40-stall riding center offers boarding facilities, rental horses, an indoor and outdoor ring, all levels of instruction, including jumping. Miles of wooded bridle trails have been cleared by Reston residents and marked with signs specifically designed for the trails. For further information, contact Ronnie Beard, Manager.

The Reston Polo Club, located in the southwest corner of Reston at Fox Mill Road and Monroe Street, not only fields a fine team from Reston, but also conducts the only polo training school in the metropolitan Washington area. The Reston Pony Club, a member of the U.S. Pony Clubs, Inc., and patterned after the famous Pony Clubs in England, has a very active membership competing in regional and national rallies. For boys and girls under 21 years of age, the Club fosters high ideals in the care and riding of horses. Jack Burton, Colonel in the U. S. Army, and a resident of Reston, is Co-District Commissioner of the Club. He also is a vice president and governor of the U. S. Pony Clubs, Inc., and former member of the U. S. SWIMMING:

Reston currently has swimming pools convenient to all homes and apartments, both in Lake Anne and Hunters Woods Villages. New pools are scheduled for construction to keep pace with population growth.

TENNIS:

All-weather tennis courts are also conveniently located within Reston's neighborhoods. New courts are scheduled for construction to keep pace with the population growth.

Like the swimming pools, the tennis courts are operated and maintained by the Homeowners Associations.

WALKWAYS:

Throughout Reston, over ten miles of paved walkways wind through "natural state" areas separated from the major vehicular routes. Walkways at eight major intersections pass beneath the road by means of special pedestrian underpasses. More are designed for major intersections in the future.

THE NATURE CENTER

The Nature Center has two inseparable functions: (1) Environmental Education (working with residents of all ages to help them to know and care about the environment and the effect their actions have upon it) and (2) Environmental Management (helping residents use this information to shape and develop open space and commonlyowned land and to maintain it in a rational manner).

The Nature Center works with clusters, the Homeowners Associations, with children and teachers in the elementary schools and at the Day Care Center . . . with youth and adult groups, and with individuals in the community who ask for help and advice.

The Nature Center initiated the establishment of and works closely with the Environmental Management Committees on all aspects of land management. It raises moral questions — about the use of pesticides, for example — to help the community decide whether short-range solutions will lead to long-range environmental problems. It also advises on the day-to-day maintenance of land.

The Nature Center publishes a monthly newsletter, NATURE NEWSNOTES, which is distributed to all residents and is designed to encourage interest in the immediate environment and to link environmental matters in Reston to larger ecological questions.

The Nature Center gives Interpretive Walks, year-round, along the walkways the residents use to go to school, church, and to stores; in the Reston Wilderness Area; in areas planted for conservation and wildlife purposes by the Nature Center, to explain the function of these plantings; through the site of the old "New Town" of Wiehle, which was planned in the last century on land Reston now occupies, to give residents a sense of history and continuity of the land; and even on the Plaza.

The Nature Center maintains a library and subscribes to a number of specialized publications which it makes available to the residents. It also maintains a constant exchange of information with a number of private and governmental agencies concerned with the entire spectrum of environmental knowledge and brings consultants from many fields into Reston to work with residents on a variety of programs which affect the land.

INDUSTRIAL RESTON

Located on 1,300 acres, the Reston Industrial Center is the home of 30 industries, a 300-seat cafeteria, and a full-service branch of the Fairfax County National Bank. Employment in the Industrial Center is now approximately 2,000.

The Reston Center offers all the benefits of a modern research park and features good transportation, competitive pricing, favorable tax climate, protective covenants and complete utilities, plus all the living and recreational amenities of Reston which surround the Center. These combined elements have brought about a successful growth story.

The pace of Reston industrial development is expected to quicken with the construction of the 21 acre Inn and Conference Center Complex in 1970. Further stimulus for industrial expansion is anticipated with the construction of half access to the Dulles Highway in 1970, to be followed by complete access in the near future.

The Reston industrial population will swell by 3,000+ when the giant U. S. Geological Survey eventually move their National Headquarters to Reston. The \$50 million headquarters building, located on a 100 acre site across from the Inn and Conference Center Complex, and designed by Skidmore, Owings and Merrill, will enclose more than 1,000,000 square feet of space when constructed.

The Topographic Division of the U.S. Geological Survey, employing approximately 100 people, is presently leasing a 28,000 square foot facility from Reston in Isaac Newton Square.
