Buildings and Grounds:

Typical brick eight-room Elementary school building of the first two decades of the century, on a three-acre plot touching the Columbia and Leesburg Pikes at Bailey's Crossroads in Fairfax County. (The building is in Fairfax County, our address is Alexandria, and we are served by a Falls Church telephone exchange.)

The building and parking area serve our needs very well at the moment and may see us through the period before we can move into new quarters on the permanent site. However, it may be necessary to extend the college day from eight in the morning until six in the afternoon.

The building is well equipped to serve our instructional needs. All instructional equipment and aids requested by instructors have been provided.

Since the initial renovation of the building, before we entered upon its use, the only improvements made have been the grading and surfacing of the parking area and the construction of offices in the basement. It is difficult to maintain the appearance of the interior of the building, both because it is old and is in use fifteen hours a day by the College and the Extension Center.

Comments:

An orientation program was conducted successfully. As part of it the Faculty gave a picnic luncheon for all students.

The newly-formed Student Assembly started functioning in a very responsible manner.

A basketball squad was formed, practicing two nights a week in the J.E.B. Stuart High School gymnasium and playing high school and college freshman teams.

A debate team was formed and participated in debate tournaments.

Student discussion of a proposed Honor System was initiated, but the indications were that an Honor System would not be adopted soon.

The Student Assembly conducted two very successful dances, an informal one during the first week of College in the Fall and a formal one during the week before Christmas.
