



The University

George Mason University began as the Northern Virginia branch of the University of Virginia in 1957 before being established as an independent member of the commonwealth's system of colleges and universities in 1972.

The university's location in the heart of the world's high-technology and information industries has given it a unique and fortuitous opportunity to be an indispensable global partner in the area's phenomenal growth. With campuses in Fairfax, Arlington, and Prince William counties, Mason is a distributed university, with each campus having a distinctive academic focus that plays a critical role in the economy of its region.

The large and diverse enrollment base features more than 28,000 students, including more than 16,000 undergraduates, who represent all 50 states, the District of Columbia, and more than 135 countries. The faculty includes recipients of awards from the National Science Foundation, the National Endowments for the Arts and the Humanities, the Guggenheim Foundation, and the Templeton Foundation, and winners of Fulbright awards and fellowships. Mason also is home to two Nobel Prize winners in economics: James M. Buchanan, PhD, retired (1986), and Vernon Smith, PhD (2002).

Mason's dynamic student body, groundbreaking research programs, technological innovations, solid academic reputation, and distinguished faculty exemplifies what a young university can successfully accomplish through foresight, determination, and hard work. The university was named the "number one up-and-coming university in the southern region" by *U.S.News & World Report*.

Great Location

George Mason's three campuses—in Arlington, Fairfax, and Prince William counties—are located in Northern Virginia, the East Coast's hotbed of information technology that includes such firms as AOL, Oracle, and Nextel. Our location provides internships and cooperative education opportunities superior to those found elsewhere. In addition, our campuses are just an average of 15 miles from the heart of Washington, D.C. You can easily visit the White House, tour the Smithsonian, cheer on the Redskins, grab a bite to eat in eclectic Adams Morgan, or bike along the C&O Canal.

Great Imagination

Established in 1972, George Mason is a relatively young university. It is not bound by tradition or old ways of thinking, but rather, it embraces technology and new approaches to learning. One example is the George W. Johnson Center, which integrates academics and student activities. The library, food court, study lounges, computer labs, cinema, banks, and student organization offices are all under one roof, offering students a multifaceted learning experience.

Great Innovation

Technology touches every academic program at Mason, from chemistry, where students use online spreadsheets to analyze data, to art, where they discuss the effects of virtual museums. Mason also offers technology-based minors in information technology, computer science, telecommunications, electronic journalism, and multimedia. Students not only choose from more than 50 traditional degree programs, but also may design their own concentration in Mason's integrative studies program, which combines independent study, mentored research, and experiential learning with traditional courses.

Undergraduates come from all 50 states and more than 127 countries, creating an environment rich in diverse cultures and ideas. Our students also participate in international internships, working at embassies as well as at the United Nations. A National Leader in Intercollegiate Athletics

George Mason University regularly ranks among the top NCAA Division I-AAA (nonfootball) programs in the country. In five of the first six years of the Sears Directors Cup Poll, the Patriots finished among the top 10 I-AAA programs, including first-place finishes in 1995 and 1997. They are perennially in the top one-third of all programs.

National Champions

Mason counts two national championships in its young athletic tradition. The Patriots won the 1985 NCAA Women's Soccer Championship and the 1996 Men's Indoor Track and Field Championship.

Student Services

Commitment to the Student-Athlete

George Mason University is well-staffed to meet the needs of its student-athletes in the highly competitive NCAA Division I market. The Athletic Department has more than 100 full-time employees, including 14 members of the athletic directors management team, on staff, providing a national caliber 4:1 ratio of staff to Mason's nearly 400 student-athletes who compete in 22 intercollegiate sports. In addition, Mason teams have the benefit of a full-time strength and conditioning coordinator and nutritionist, a full-time sports psychologist, a full-time director of community relations, and a full-time NCAA life skills coordinator. Rounding out the athletics staff are four full-time personnel in athletic training, four in academic support, four in facilities and events operations, four in marketing and sponsorships, and five in sports information and public relations and weight training areas. To support its own efforts, the Athletic Department has access to a wide range of university resources allowing it to provide comprehensive and progressive services.

Student Services and Welfare

The services provided for the health and welfare of student-athletes focus on their needs while in college. The ultimate goal is to use the college experience to help student-athletes become adults who enjoy satisfying lives. In providing this support, these services attend to the knowledge, skills, attitude, and personal health needed by student-athletes to succeed athletically, academically, socially, and as citizens of the university and the community of which they are a part.

Mason is one of a growing number of schools in the nation to offer student-athletes not only assistance in the academic and athletic venues, but also help so that they become more well-rounded individuals. **Debbie Wilson**, PhD, sports psychologist, counsels student-athletes on psychological concerns and performance enhancement.

Life Skills Program



The Life Skills Program is under the direction of former Patriot and NCAA National Champion **Nena Rogers.** The program, in its fourth year at George Mason University, helps student-athletes meet their changing needs as college students, athletes, and members of society. It uses the college student-athlete experience to prepare them to be successful in life and to become contributing adult members of society. It promotes an image of intercollegiate

athletics as an integral part of the college experience and the student-athlete as an integrated member of the general student body.

The Life Skills Program focuses on three key components:

Commitment to Personal Development: To support the development of a well-balanced lifestyle for student-athletes, encouraging emotional well-being, personal growth, and decision-making skills.

Commitment to Career Development: To encourage the studentathlete to develop and pursue career and life goals.

Commitment to Service: To encourage the student-athlete in service to his/her campus and surrounding communities.

Although the Life Skills Program focuses on the need of the student-athlete's welfare in college, its ultimate goal is the development of adults who will have satisfying lives that make positive, meaningful contributions.

Student-Athlete Advisory Council


The Student-Athlete Advisory Council (SAAC) is a committee made up of student-athletes that provides a medium of communication between the student-athlete and the athletic administration, Student Government, faculty, and community. In addition, provide feedback and insight into athletic department issues, disseminate information, build a sense of community within the Athletic Department involving all athletic teams, organize community service efforts, and promote a positive student-athlete image on campus. This organizations membership includes two student-athletes from each intercollegiate team including the cheerleaders and student trainers.

Sports Medicine and Strength and Conditioning Training

Take a look behind the scenes of George Mason University athletics and you will find a group of people integral to the success of Patriot student-athletes—Mason's sports medicine and strength and conditioning staffs. The Sports Medicine Department, located in the Recreation Sports Complex (the Field House), is equipped with the latest in medical supplies and technology.

Sports Medicine

The staff consists of four full-time certified athletic trainers, two certified graduate students, and a number of widely respected local doctors who tend to nearly 400 Patriot student-athletes. **Linda Pullen**, who has been on the Mason staff since 1984, is coordinator of sports medicine and

Another integral factor to the success of Mason student-athletes is the state-of-the-art weight room located in the Field House. An excellent strength and conditioning program, vital for every student-athlete, has been exclusively designed for each team to meet its specific needs. **Robert**

Handerahan, head strength and conditioning coordinator, is responsible for the design and implementation of strength and conditioning programs for all athletic teams. Handerahan is assisted by Todd Hamer.

The Patriot Club

The Patriot Club was established in 1975 to create greater interest in and financial support for Mason varsity athletics. A component of both the Athletic Department and the George Mason University Foundation, the Patriot Club is charged with enhancing the visibility of Mason athletics, engaging individuals and businesses in Mason's Division I athletic programs, and soliciting donations for the Student-Athlete Scholarship Fund. The Patriot Club comprises university faculty members, alumni, and friends of Mason's Intercollegiate Athletics.

Communications and Marketing

Mason's Sports Information and Public Relations Office promotes timely and accurate coverage of the Patriots by coordinating interviews, meeting the information needs of reporters, and compiling and maintaining Patriot statistics, photographs, and historical records. The office offers many media services:

- www.GoMason.com The Patriots' official web site contains more than 800 web pages of information on the Athletic Department. The site includes up-to-date information on student-athletes with biographies, statistics, and comprehensive game day information.
- Patriot Sports Hotline (703-993-4074) This 24-hour hotline gives Mason sports fans updated game and event results and statistics within an hour of an event's conclusion.
- Video streaming—Live video webcasting is provided for both men's and women's basketball home games. The stateof-the-art streaming software used for the webcasts offers tremendous picture quality to fans with fast or broadband Internet connections.
- Video services—A complete video archive of all Mason intercollegiate athletics teams is maintained. Tapes are completely logged and are available to local media.





First-Class Facilities

The George Mason University campuses are home to some of the finest athletic facilities in the country.


The Patriot Center is a superb 10,000-seat arena and home of the men's and women's basketball teams. Mason fans have watched the Patriot men earn four postseason appearances—twice in the NCAA Tournament and twice in the National Invitational Tournament (NIT)—in the past six seasons, while the women advanced to the Women's NIT in 2001 and 2004. On February 16, 2001, the men set a facility record with one of the largest on-campus crowds in Virginia state basketball history when nearly 10,000 fans cheered on the Patriots over James Madison. This season for the first time, the Patriot Center will host the Colonial Athletic Association (CAA) Women's Basketball Championships. In addition, the facility hosts more than 100 events per year, including concerts and other live performances. The building will undergo a renovation in the next year to create more amenities for the fans and a greater environment as part of the facilities master plan.

George Mason Stadium is an expertly landscaped outdoor facility and home to the men's and women's soccer teams, the men's and women's outdoor track and field teams, and the women's lacrosse team. The stadium has grandstand seating for 5,000 spectators, an all-weather track, and an electronic scoreboard. A


quality Musco lighting system was added prior to the 2002–03 season to allow for expanded use of the facility at night.

George Mason Stadium has hosted NCAA championship soccer matches as well as practices for the U.S. Men's National Soccer Team, the U.S. Women's National Soccer Team, and visiting teams that participated in World Cup competition in 1994 and 1999. George Mason Stadium was the 2003 Sports Turf Managers Association Soccer Field of the Year in the College/University Division.

The stadium also has been the host facility for many ECAC/ IC4A Outdoor Championships, which feature some of the top track and field athletes on the East Coast, and served as the site for the inaugural NCAA East Regional Track and Field Championships in May 2003.



The Aquatic and Fitness Center, which opened in 1998 on the Fairfax Campus, is an eye-catching and well-designed facility. The center was named as a 1999 Facility of Merit by Athletic Business magazine. The Jim McKay Natatorium, located inside the Aquatic and Fitness Center, has been the host facility for the past five CAA Swimming and Diving Championships and has become the event's annual home. The \$11.2 million, 66,000-square-foot complex features a 50-meter Olympic-size pool and a 25-yard recreational pool. The center, which also includes a fitness gallery, classrooms, whirlpool, and sauna, will undergo expansion to include additional space for fitness equipment and fitness rooms.



The John Linn Memorial Gymnasium, located in the Physical Education Building, is home to the men's and women's volleyball teams and the wrestling team. With seating for 2,800 spectators, the facility has been the site of several CAA championship events and host to NCAA Tournament volleyball matches in 1995 and 1996.



The George Mason Softball Complex
was the site of the 2000 Eastern College
Athletic Conference Division I Softball
Championships. The field is an outstanding,
well-maintained, and high-quality playing

facility.

The Freedom Aquatic and Fitness Center on the Prince William Campus is an \$18.3 million building, the largest of its kind on the East Coast, and the result of a partnership between the university and local

The Recreation Sports Complex (Field House) contains an indoor track, weight and locker rooms, saunas, basketball courts, and an indoor multipurpose practice facility used by the baseball, softball, lacrosse, and soccer teams. Home to the indoor men's and women's track and field teams, the complex has been host to the Mobil Invitational and the USA Track and Field Golden Spike Invitational Indoor meets.

Raymond H. "Hap" Spuhler Field is widely regarded as one of the top collegiate baseball complexes in the Mid-Atlantic region. The field has grandstand seating for 900 spectators, an enclosed press box, and an electronic scoreboard. The field was named the 2002 Sports Turf Managers Association Baseball Field of the Year in the College/University Division.

Academic Services

The staff of the Academic Services Program in the Department in Intercollegiate Athletics at George Mason University is dedicated to helping student-athletes develop the intellectual skills, work habits, and academic resumes that will serve as the basis for personally satisfying adult lives that make positive contributions to society.

The Academic Services staff provides support for each studentathlete during the college experience so that he/she will:

- · Complete a degree in a timely manner;
- · Maintain academic eligibility to participate in an NCAA sport;
- Have a positive college experience; and become a critically thinking adult who demonstrates self-accountability for learning.

At Mason, Academic Coordinators in the Academic Services Program work directly with individual student-athletes, coaches, and teams. Specific help is given to each student-athlete in adjusting to the combined athletic, academic, and social expectations at the college level.

Most college student-athletes benefit from working with qualified professionals in learning to manage time effectively and balancing athletics with academic demands. They also learn to develop necessary study skills, meet expectations of increasing self-accountability, and make career development choices that help ensure their success as college students, athletes, and graduates. Although many enhancement experiences are offered in small-group, team, and classroom settings, individual support is available to student-athletes as determined by the individual's need and availability.

Dr. Debbie Wilson was named the Associate Athletic Director for Academic Services in July 2003. She oversees all aspects of the Academic Services Program. Dr. Wilson, who came to George Mason in 1988, also serves the Athletic Department as a Sports Psychologist. In that role, she counsels student-athletes on personal, social, and athletic performance concerns. A former women's basketball coach at Ohio State University, she holds a doctorate

on personal, social, and athletic performance concerns. A former women's basketball coach at Ohio State University, she holds a doctorate in counseling psychology from the University of Maryland. She is a licensed psychologist.

Pam Bruno, an academic coordinator in the Academic Services Program, joined the staff in 2000. She received a bachelor's degree in psychology from George Mason University and added a master's degree in human resource development and a certificate in Instructional Systems Design from Marymount University in 1996. Bruno works directly with the student-athletes and is primarily responsible for the coordination of the student-athlete tutoring program and registration for classes.





Cheryl Ann Hunte, Senior Academic
Coordinator, joined the staff in 2004. She
obtained her master's degree in Education
(Counseling) in 1996 from St. John's University,
Queens New York where she worked as the
Assistant Dean in the College of Liberal Arts
and Science upon graduation. She served
as an adjunct professor to newly admitted
freshman and as the Academic Dean for
student-athletes, where she developed and

implemented an academic tutorial program for Division I athletes and employed tracking system to ensure athlete compliance with university-mandated graduation requirements.

George Reese, Esq., an academic coordinator in the Academic Services Program, joined the staff in July 2003. He has a bachelor's degree in business from Lincoln University in Pennsylvania, extensive graduate study in public administration at the University of Pittsburgh, and a doctorate in jurisprudence from The George Washington University. An attorney at

law, Reese is a member of the Pennsylvania Bar Association and the National Bar Association. An officer in the U.S. Army during the Vietnam era, he later spent 25 years at NASA as a staff attorney and managing attorney with the Office of General Counsel and as the

administrator in the Office of Equal Opportunity Programs.



Felisha Sheperd-White, an academic coordinator in the Academic Services Program, joined the staff in 2003. She has a bachelor's degree in psychology from NC State University and added a master's degree in experimental psychology from Towson University. Before joining Mason's staff, she spent two years as a research assistant at the Northern Virginia Mental Health Institute in Falls Church, Va. She assisted the director of performance

improvement and research in the coordination of performance improvement and clinical research activities.

Academic Resource Center and Computer Lab

The Academic Resource Center and Computer Lab is a study environment dedicated for use by student-athletes. PC-style computers are available to accommodate the accessibility needs of student-athletes.





Tutoring

All student-athletes are eligible to receive tutoring through the Academic Services Program. Tutoring is available upon request and within the resources of the program.

Travel and Competition Verification

The Academic Services Program assists student-athletes in providing professors with verification when a missed class or class experience is due to participation in or travel to regularly scheduled athletic competition.

Eligibility, Degree Progress, and Degree Completion

The staff of the Academic Services Program assists student-athletes in ensuring that their scheduled classes help them meet NCAA academic eligibility requirements. Although responsibility for meeting graduation requirements is shared between the student-athlete and his/her academic advisor, the staff helps student-athletes balance the training and competitive demands of collegiate sport experiences with those of the student-athletes' chosen degree programs. The academic performance and progress of each student-athlete is systematically monitored and the results are made available to the student-athlete and his/her head coach.

George Mason Athletics Logo

At George Mason University, the athletics tradition is constantly growing and evolving, and the Athletics logo has gone through several changes to better reflect the speed, strength, excitement, and energy of Mason athletics. Research was conducted regarding the logo and a plan was put in place to give it a new look. The resulting new Athletics logo was introduced at the beginning of the 2004–05 school year.



MASON ATHLETIC HISTORY

George Mason University's young but storied athletics history has seen outstanding achievement in the past four decades and has developed the groundwork for unlimited suc-

cess in the future.

Under President Dr. Alan Merten and Assistant Vice President and Director of Intercollegiate Athletics Tom O'Connor, the George Mason Department of Intercollegiate Athletics currently sponsors 22 varsity sports and provides services for nearly 400 studentathletes with more than 300 intercollegiate athletic events per year.

George Mason competes in the Colonial Athletic Association (CAA) and National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA). In addition, the Patriots are members of the Eastern College Athletic Conference (ECAC), the Intercollegiate Association of Amateur Athletes of America (IC4A) and the Eastern Intercollegiate Volleyball Association (EIVA).

The CAA was formed in 1985 out of the old ECAC South, which primarily was a basketball league. George Mason joined American University, East Carolina University, James Madison University, the University of North Carolina at Wilmington, the University of Richmond, the U.S. Naval Academy and the College of William & Mary as original members. Old Dominion University replaced Navy (departed to join the Patriot League) in 1991, and Virginia Commonwealth University joined in 1995.

In 2001-02, the CAA saw its first radical changes in membership. Leaving for new conferences were American (Patriot League), East Carolina (Conference USA) and Richmond (Atlantic 10), while former America East Conference members the University of Delaware, Drexel University, Hofstra University and Towson University entered the CAA to form a new 10-team conference. This year the CAA welcomed two members, Northeastern University and Georgia State University.

The Patriots compete in men's and women's basketball, cross country, soccer, swimming & diving, tennis, track & field and volleyball. There also are teams in baseball, golf and wrestling for men and softball, rowing and lacrosse for women. George Mason competes for CAA championships in all sports



except men's volleyball.

George Mason's athletic tradition began with the formation of the men's basketball team in 1966-67, when the school was still known as George Mason College and was a branch campus of the University of Virginia (it became an independent university in 1972). Baseball and men's cross country followed in 1967-68, men's soccer and golf began the following year, and with the addition of men's tennis in 1969-70, the Patriots were competing in six intercollegiate sports.

Wrestling became a varsity sport in 1972-73, along with women's tennis, which became the first women's sport at George Mason. Women's basketball and volleyball came aboard the following year, men's volleyball joined the scene in 1974-75, men's and women's track & field began in 1975-76, women's cross country started in 1976-77 and softball in 1977-78. When women's soccer came on board in 1982-83, George Mason offered 10 men's and eight women's sports.

The Patriots began to move from NAIA and NCAA Division II status into the NCAA Division I ranks with men's basketball in the 1978-79 season. Within a few years, all other sports also were elevated to Division I status. George Mason reached its current level of 22 varsity sports (11 for men, 11 for women) with the addition of women's lacrosse (1993-94), women's rowing (1997-98) and men's and women's swimming & diving (1999-2000).

George Mason has been very successful at the NCAA Division I level, producing national champions in women's soccer (defeat-

ing perennial power North Carolina in 1985) and men's indoor track & field (1996). The trap and skeet team, which involves both men and women and is currently listed as a varsity club sport, won 10 consecutive national championships under the Association of College Unions-International (ACU-I) banner from 1986-95, and

cheerleading brought home the Universal Cheerleading Association title in 1990. In addition, numerous men and women have won individual national championships in track & field.

The men's volleyball team has reached the NCAA "Final Four" championship round on three occasions, and the men's and women's soccer, baseball and women's volleyball teams have advanced to NCAA regional play on numerous occasions. At the CAA level, George Mason has won a total of 42 championships in baseball (2), men's basketball (3), women's cross country (4), men's soccer (4), women's soccer (1), women's swimming & diving (4), men's track & field (3), women's track & field (9 straight from 1990-98), women's volleyball (7, including 5 in a row from 1992-96) and wrestling (5).

Overall, a total of 23 George Mason student-athletes have claimed 35 individual national championships, 13 George Mason teams have made more than 117 NCAA postseason appearances, Patriot student-athletes have earned national All-America honors 300+ times and have captured 280 individual CAA championships. Within the CAA, Mason also can boast that 36 Patriots have claimed conference Player of the Year honors a total of 47 times, 16 coaches have been named Coach of the Year a total of 41 times, and 40 George Mason athletes have been selected as the CAA Rookie of the Year. In addition, six Patriots have received national CoSIDA/Verizon Academic All-America rec-



ognition, most recently Chris Looze, who in 2005 became the first Mason student-athlete to garner academic player of the year in baseball

Among its peers in the NCAA, George Mason regularly ranks among the top NCAA Division I-AAA (non-football) programs. In five of the first six years of the Sears Directors Cup Poll (launched in 1993), the Patriots finished in the top 10 among I-AAA programs, including first-place finishes in 1995 and in 1997, and they are perennially among the top one-third of all programs.

George Mason is home to some of the finest on-campus facilities in the country, including the Patriot Center, George Mason Stadium, the Jim McKay Natatorium at the Aquatic and Fitness Center, Freedom Aquatic and Fitness Center (on the Prince William Campus), George Mason Fieldhouse, Raymond H. "Hap" Spuhler Field, George Mason Softball Complex and the John Linn Memorial Gymnasium at the Physical Education Building.

George Mason University is properly staffed to meet the needs of its student-athletes. The athletic department has a full-time strength and conditioning coordinator, a full-time sports psychologist, a full-time life skills coordinator and full-time personnel in the athletic training, academics, facilities/events, marketing, sports information and weight training areas. In addition, the department has access to a wide range of University-sponsored resources to provide comprehensive and up-to-date student services.



The Patriot Club is charged with raising annual funds toward the Student-Athlete Scholarship Fund and capital funds for new and improved athletic facility projects. In addition, the Patriot Club engages individuals and businesses in Mason athletics. The annual scholarship fund helps to provide the scholarship cost for over 400 Patriot studentathletes. Contributions to the Patriot Club are handled through the GMU Foundation, a 501(c) (3) organization, and are tax deductible. Patriot Club donors include, but are not limited to, alumni, former student-athletes, parents of former and current athletes, corporations, George Mason faculty, staff and coaches, and other friends of the University.

In 2004-2005, the scholarship bill for athletics was met for the fourth consecutive year. More than 500 donors made contributions totaling more than \$280,000 to support the scholarship funding for Mason studentathletes.

The upcoming year promises to be an exciting one as the Patriot Club has developed a new theme called "Partners for Champions." As donors to the Patriot Club, individuals and businesses are partnering with George Mason University, Patriot student-athletes, coaches, administrators and faculty to help create Champions. And not just Champions on the field, court, mat, track, course or pool, but Champions in the classroom and even for life.

The Patriot Club's giving year mirrors the fiscal year of July 1st - June 30th. Basketball season ticket priority is given to those donors who make contributions prior to October 1st. Donors at various levels are also afforded certain benefits. Contributions are tax-deductible at up to 80% for those who receive benefits and 100% for those who forgo any benefits.





UNIVERSITY PRESIDENT



The reputation of George Mason University as a progressive, innovative institution of higher learning has continued to gain in strength and scope under the presidency of Dr. Alan G. Merten. Since being named as the university's fifth president in March 1996, George Mason has gained national and even international acclaim for a number of significant initiatives and achievements ranging from the launching of its first-ever capital campaign and becoming the first university to host the World Congress on Information Technology to being named among the "most wired" universities in the United States and dramatically increasing its basic and applied research activities.

During Dr. Merten's tenure as George Mason's chief executive officer, the university has become the fastest growing university in Virginia, with student enrollment climbing from 24,000 in 1996 to more than 29,600 today. The quality of George Mason's students at all levels has increased dramatically during this time. Coinciding with this growth is the emergence of George Mason University as a vital center of cultural, academic, and athletic activity for the entire Northern Virginia-Washington, D.C. region. As a result of Dr. Merten's ongoing outreach efforts, an estimated two million people visit George Mason's three campuses each year to attend and participate in a range of events and activities, including lectures, conferences, sports competitions, concerts, recitals, and theatrical productions

George Mason University is also the only institution of higher learning in Virginia with two Nobel Laureates on its faculty. Dr. James Buchanan received the Nobel Prize in Economics in 1986. In 2002, Dr. Vernon Smith, professor of economics and law, was awarded the Nobel Prize in Economic Sciences.

Under Dr. Merten's leadership, two new schools have been established at George Mason: the School of Computational Sciences and College of Visual and Performing Arts. Building on its strengths in the information sciences, the university has recently developed innovative teaching and research programs in the humanities, public

policy and the biological sciences. George Mason is presently immersed in a far-reaching building program that is unprecedented among academic institutions. This growth is particularly noteworthy as it comes at a time of severe budget constraints throughout the Commonwealth of Virginia.

Most recently, Dr. Merten led the university in a celebration of the success of its first capital campaign. Mason exceeded its initial goal of \$110 million by raising \$142 million.

Prior to coming to George Mason University, Dr. Merten served as the dean and professor of information systems at the Johnson Graduate School of Management of Cornell University from 1989 to 1996. In addition, he served as a professor of information services at Cornell.

He was dean of the College of Business Administration at the University of Florida from 1986-1989, where he also served as a professor of information systems. From 1970 to 1986, he worked at the University of Michigan, first as an assistant professor of industrial and operations engineering. During his tenure there, Dr. Merten rose to the rank of associate dean in the School of Business Administration and gained a full professorship.


Between 1970 and 1986, Dr. Merten also was a visiting professor in residence at the Institute European d'Administration des Affairs in France, a visiting research scientist at IBM Research in San Jose, CA, and an expert in the United Nations Development Program in Hungary.

Throughout his career, he has served on business and government councils and committees, holding several leadership roles. Dr. Merten was chair of the National Research Council's Committee on Workforce Needs in Information Technology. He serves on the Board of Directors of the Greater Washington Board of Trade, the Center for Innovative Technology, INOVA Health Systems, two information technology companies, and a mutual fund trust. Dr. Merten was a member of the Governor's Blue Ribbon Commission on Higher Education.

He has been recognized for his contributions to the Northern Virginia technology community, as a leader of the Greater Washington, D.C., business community, and for his contributions to the use of information technology in the federal government.

Dr. Merten has an undergraduate degree in mathematics from the University of Wisconsin, a master's degree in computer science from Stanford University, and a Ph.D. degree in computer science from Wisconsin.

He and his wife, Sally, have two children, Eric and Melissa.

Dr. Maurice (Morrie) William Scherrens, Senior Vice President

Dr. Scherrens has held the position of Senior Vice President since 1996. In this role, he retained all former responsibilities of Chief Business Officer and assumed expanded responsibility to include the direction and management of Facilities, Construction Management, Physical Plant, Campus Police, Institutional Planning and Research, and Support Service Operations. This new position includes increased visibility with state legislators and executive officials in Richmond, Virginia while sharing executive management responsibilities for the internal operations of the University with the Provost. Responsibilities also include increased coordination with business and community leaders within the surrounding local jurisdictions. Dr. Scherrens has previously served successively at George Mason as the Executive Vice President, (1985-1996), the Vice President for Finance & Planning, (1979-1985), the Assistant Vice President, Business and Finance, (1977-1979), and Budget Director (1973-1975).

His service to the University and to the academic community across the country is reflected in his fifteen years of participation in the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools institutional assessment process as well as the NCAA re-certification process. His consultation and advice; assistance in performance measure evaluation; and review of potential "best practices" has been seen most recently at the following institutions:

She represents George Mason University and its faculty in the institution's relationships with the NCAA and its member conferences. Ms. Miller is also the Chairwoman of the Athletic Council, a faculty senate-selected council that advises George Mason president Dr. Alan Merten on all matters related to intercollegiate athletics.

Ms. Miller is Associate Dean for Academic Affairs and Student Advancement. She received her MFA in Dance from the University of Hawaii. She has performed with the Cincinnati Ballet and Opera, Ruth Page's International Ballet Company, Hawaii Dance Theatre and Repertory West. In Washington D.C. she has performed with numerous companies and choreographers including the Washington Opera. Linda has choreographed works for university productions and musical theatre including the award-winning *Pirates of Penzance*. She was nominated for a Helen Hayes award for her choreography in Interact's *H.M.S. Pinafore*.

TOM O'CONNOR, ASSISTANT V.P./DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS



Tom O'Connor is currently in his 12th year at George Mason University and his fourth decade in NCAA Division I athletics after ushering in a new age in intercollegiate athletics upon his arrival in Fairfax. Named the athletic director at George Mason on November 1, 1994, he added the title of assistant vice president in 1999.

O'Connor is widely regarded as an innovative, conscientious and visionary administrator whose bold leadership has advanced four Division I institutions. His major priority is to facilitate the University's commitment to its student-athletes, both academically and athletically. He has helped create an administrative process committed to excellence in the areas of academic assistance, gender equity and compliance with NCAA rules and regulations.

Under O'Connor's guidance, George Mason was one of the nation's first 15 schools to complete the NCAA certification process, and it completed a second cycle of athletics certification in February 2003. He also spearheaded an effort by the University to come into full compliance with Title IX. As a result, George Mason perennially ranks among the nation's best in the Equity in Athletics Disclosure Act survey.

In addition, George Mason athletic facilities have improved

greatly during O'Connor's tenure. The Aquatic and Fitness Center, a first-class recreation and competition facility, opened on the Fairfax campus in 1998, while each campus athletics venue has received upgrades over the past decade.

At the NCAA level, O'Connor completed his first year of his five-year term on the 10-member NCAA Division I Men's Basketball Championship Committee. O'Connor is the first representative in the Colonial Athletic Association's 19-year history to be appointed to the committee, which has control, direction and supervision of the NCAA Division I Men's Basketball Championship. He currently is a member of the Division I Strategic Planning Committee and has been appointed to the Selection Review Committee. He was involved with the NCAA restructuring process as a member of the business/ finance cabinet, and finished a term as a member of the NCAA Men's Basketball Rules Committee, 1997-2003. He recently completed his term on the prestigious Management Council. He also is a member of the Executive Council of the NACDA Division I-AAA Athletic Directors Association. He completed a two-year term as the President of the Colonial Athletic Association on July 1, 2004.

O'Connor previously served as athletic director at Loyola (MD) College (1976-86), at Santa Clara University (1986-92) and at St. Bonaventure University (1992-94). He was also the head basketball coach at Dartmouth College (1972-74) and at Loyola (1974-76), and his age of 25 when he became head coach at Dartmouth ranks him as the sixth-youngest head coach to ever take over a NCAA Division I program.

A native of Union City, NJ, the 58-year-old O'Connor earned a B.A. degree in 1968 from Assumption (MA) College, where he was a four-year basketball letterwinner. He is a member of the Assumption College Athletic Hall of Fame. He received the 2004 Pathfinder Award at the New England Basketball Hall of Fame induction ceremony in September.

Many of O'Connor's teams have reached regional and national heights. Loyola won the 1976 men's soccer national championship, while Santa Clara's 1989 men's soccer team was the co-national champion with Virginia and the 1991 squad was the national runner-up. The school also earned NCAA bids in men's and women's basketball, women's soccer and baseball. At George Mason, the men's indoor track and field team won the 1996 national championship and the outdoor squad placed second. In the annual Sears Directors' Cup standings, the Patriots ranked first among Division I-AAA (non-football) institutions in 1995 and 1997.

Tom and his wife Barbara reside in Fairfax. The couple has four children and eight grandchildren.


